The powers and duties of the Co-Chairs are :

- 3. By the mutual consent of the Co-Chairs, special meetings may be called, or upon request of a majority of the Committee, four (4) users and four (4) community representatives.
- 4. To sign as Co-Chairs, all instruments in writing that may require such signature, unless the membership shall otherwise direct, and to perform such other duties and tasks as the Bylaws or as the membership shall from time to time prescribe.
- 5. Each segment of the Committee, by a majority vote, shall elect their respective Co-Chair.

# MAC NOISE MITIGATION TIMELINE



Over 7,800 single-family homes mitigated

1992-2006

Over 1,300 multi-> family units mitigated

18 schools mitigated

Property acquisition of over 435 residences

Total cost: \$385.6 million



#### First Amendment to the Consent Decree

- In 2013, the parties of the 2007 Consent Decree jointly filed the First Amendment to the Consent Decree
- Commits the MAC to provide noise mitigation services until 2023
- Eligibility of single-family and multifamily homes will be determined annually, based upon actual noise contours that are developed for the preceding calendar year



Second Amendment to the Consent Decree

- In 2016, the parties of the 2007 Consent Decree jointly filed the Second Amendment to the Consent Decree
- Changed language to allow the new use of the new federally approved noise model

- Provided clarifying language regarding Opt-Out Eligibility criteria:
  - Homeowners not participating in the reimbursement program are not considered "Opt-Outs" and may participate in future programs provided the home meets eligibility requirements
  - Single-family homes that previously opted out of the Partial Noise Reduction Package may participate in the Full 5 dB Reduction Package provided the home meets the eligibility requirements



Mitigation Eligibility and Packages

- Per the amended Consent Decree, a home will become eligible if it is located, for a period of three consecutive years
  - in the actual 60-64 DNL noise contour, and
  - within a higher noise impact mitigation area when compared to the noise mitigation program under the Consent Decree, prior to the amendment
- The MAC will begin providing noise mitigation to homeowners in the year following their determination of eligibility



#### Mitigation Eligibility and Packages

The amended Consent Decree specifies 2 different mitigation packages for qualified single-family homes, depending on noise exposure level:

- Full 5-decibel Reduction Package
- Partial Noise Reduction Package

And 1 mitigation package for qualified multifamily units:

 Acoustical covers and Pull Through Air Conditioners (PTAC) installations if none exist



Mitigation Eligibility and Packages

### **Full Five-decibel Reduction Package**

Reduces interior noise levels by an average of five decibels, achieved by application of some or all of the following:

- Repair/replacement of exterior windows
- Addition, repair and/or replacement of exterior acoustic storm windows
- Repair/replacement of existing prime doors
- Addition, repair and/or replacement of exterior acoustic storm doors



- Addition of wall and attic insulation
- Baffling of roof vents and chimney treatment
- Addition of central air conditioning



Note: Any reimbursement or mitigation improvements previously provided by the MAC will be deducted from the above-listed options.

#### Mitigation Eligibility and Packages

### Partial Noise Reduction Package

Eligible homeowners pick one of the following:

 – Phase 4A: Installation of central air conditioning and a total not to exceed \$5,395\* of noise mitigation products and services, including reasonable and customary installation costs; or



 – Phase 4B: A total not to exceed \$18,884\* of noise mitigation products and services, including reasonable and customary installation costs.



\*The mitigation budget for each home will be adjusted each year using the Consumer Price Index for the previous year. Any reimbursement previously provided by the MAC will be deducted from the allotted mitigation dollars.

Mitigation Eligibility and Packages

- A single 3-year contract to provide the various noise mitigation measures was awarded by the MAC in January 2017
- Contract will provide coverage for homes eligible for execution from 2017-2019


#### 2017 Mitigation Program

- The 2013/2014/2015 actual noise contours qualified 138 single-family and 88 multi-family homes for the Partial Noise Reduction Package
- In collaboration with the City of Minneapolis, letters confirming home's eligibility were sent in June 2016





#### 2017 Mitigation Program

- A series of three Homeowner Orientation meetings were held in March 2017
- Design Visits of homes began in March 2017
- Construction on the first homes began in June 2017
- All 2017 Mitigation Program homes will be completed by December 31, 2017

#### 2018 Mitigation Program

- The 2014/2015/2016 actual noise contours qualified 164 single-family homes for the Partial Noise Reduction Package and 123 single-family homes for the Full 5 dB Reduction Package
- In collaboration with the City of Minneapolis, letters, questionnaires, and orientation meeting invites were sent to qualified homeowners in June 2017





#### 2018 Mitigation Program

- A series of six Homeowner Orientation meetings will be held on a monthly basis beginning in July 2017
- Design Visits of homes will begin in August 2017
- Construction efforts will begin in January 2018
- All 2018 Mitigation Program homes will be completed by December 31, 2018

Item 6: Fly Quiet Award Program Evaluation

The 2017 NOC Work Plan includes an evaluation of the benefits, challenges and applicability of a Fly Quiet Award Program at MSP. Some U.S. airports have instituted such programs. Staff conducted a baseline evaluation of three existing programs.



#### **Item 6: Fly Quiet Award Program Evaluation**



### <u>Vancouver</u> International (YVR)

- Award based on average annual noise levels at noise monitors located under their main departure runway
- Some airlines are pleased, however the award has not resulted in airlines changing operations to comply with the award criteria



### <u>Oakland</u> International (OAK)

- Award based on adherence to existing voluntary noise abatement procedures
- Has not been awarded in several years due to staffing limitations





#### Seattle-Tacoma

#### **International**



- Award based on adherence to noise abatement procedures, single event noise levels at noise monitors, field rule violations for ground run-ups
- The airport does not receive much feedback from operators, other than they are happy to receive the award
